We hope you'll join us next Friday, March 6, for an important and timely program on Pollinators with Master Gardener, Rebecca Schoenenberger. More than three-quarters of the world's food production rely on pollination by insects and animals. There are more than 20,000 species of wild bees alone, plus



many species of butterflies, wasps, beetles, birds, and bats. Thousands of these species are now at risk due to habitat loss, changes in land use, intensive agricultural practices and pesticide use, invasive species and pests, disease, and climate change. Many of these species are facing extinction. In addition to threatening food security, pollinator decline will have serious implications for the global economy and the ecosystem at large. You can help by providing habitat for them in your garden.

There's No Business like Show Business!

Who started this flower show nonsense?! Well, the earliest recorded official flower shows appeared during the 1830's. The Victorian era ushered in a great upsurge of shows of every kind and these events were wonderful entertainment.

Plant nurseries and market gardens were generally found just on the perimeters of towns and villages. Traditional market towns were usually spaced approximately 8-15 miles apart, making it easy enough for a nurseryman to transport his plants or vegetables to market by horse and cart. However, like retailers everywhere, they were always looking for ways to attract new customers, and the idea of a plant show for trade nurseries was born.

Naturally, these shows had a competitive element which encouraged the exhibitors to put up elaborate displays, especially if there was prize money to be won. The "Golden Age" of flower shows was from the 1950's to mid-1980's. There were hundreds of professional show exhibitors traveling around the country from April to November. As they would often see one another at the many different shows, there was a great feeling of camaraderie amongst exhibitors, similar to our experience at our shows in Region 14.

What does a flower show have to offer? Flower shows, and iris shows in particular, show the most beautiful varieties that cannot be found in any garden center. At our shows, the public (and members!) can find and be inspired by the unusual and rarer species and varieties to make our gardens unique.

Our show is April 25-26th at Westgate Mall, 1600 Saratoga Ave., San Jose. Be there and participate.

Artistic for CBRIS Spring Show 2020 - 'Iris Centennial'

Section A: 'Beginning of Time'

Any type of arrangement featuring the iris

- ► Designer's choice
- ► Natural material only
- ▶ Limited to Novice and Beginner 3 or fewer blue ribbons previously awarded

Section B: 'Many a Moon'

A traditional mass arrangement showing an abundance of iris. A limited amount of other flowers may be used.

- ► Natural materials only
- ▶ Open to all

Section C: 'Countdown'

A miniature design featuring iris. Use of other natural flowers and greenery is allowed. The arrangement should be no more than 12 inches in any direction including the container.

- ► Natural materials only
- ▶ Open to all

Section D: 'Eternity'

Any oriental design using line, shape and form representing time.

- ► Natural materials only
- ▶ Open to all

Section E: 'Time After Time'

Guys, let's see those iris flowers again and again; other flowers and greenery may be used.

- ► Natural materials only
- ► Open to men only

Section F: 'Jubilee'

Youth only featuring the iris — other flowers may be used. Any type of material and accessories are allowed.

- ► Designer's choice
- ► Open to youth under 19 years of age

Iris Culture

With all this sunny weather, the irises have certainly begun to grow. If you have not already done so, apply a balanced fertilizer as soon as possible. It will give you a bigger bloom. It takes about six weeks for the fertilizer to reach the rhizome.

PCIs and dwarf bearded will soon be in bloom if not already showing their color. Some of the early tall bearded have started to bloom in our area.

Keep the weeds away from your iris plants. Weeds compete with your irises for water and nutrients. Protect new growth from snails and slugs. If you are having a problem with leaf spot, trim those diseased leaves so it does not spread.

No rain? Water the irises about once a week – water deeply. The iris plant needs water when sending up their stalks so they will be strong and produce great blooms for the Spring Show.

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
