We are pleased to welcome Diana and Steve Steps as our guest speakers for our June meeting. Diana and Steve will be presenting a program on Nontoxic gardening: a topic of increasing importance and urgency as we confront the impact of human activity on global soil degradation, loss of biodiversity and pollinator decline. Non-toxic gardening goes beyond organic gardening; organic gardening is only a part of the sustainable landscape that must include water conservation, mulching, beneficial insects and the preservation of soil health. Diana and Steve are long-time, active members of The American Rose Society, and while their presentation is geared toward Non-toxic Rose Growing, it is applicable to anyone looking to be a more eco-responsible gardener.

Diana has a Bachelor's degree in Chemical Engineering and Steve has a Master's degree in Electrical Engineering. Steve is the past ARS Regional 9 Director, past District Director, past Deputy Director and was the Treasurer of the Northern California, Nevada Hawaii (NCNH) district for 6 years. Minutes CBRIS Meeting, May 7, 2021

Co-President Carol Dahout called the meeting to order at 7:30. There were 24 members on the call.

Program

Our guest speaker was Howard Dash of Picacho Mountain Iris in Las Cruces, New Mexico.

Howard moved from New Paltz, New York to Las Cruces, New Mexico in 2009. He lives in Zone 8 at an elevation of almost 4,000 feet and where in 2020 there were 40 days over 100 degrees. He began hybridizing in 2010 and introduced his first cultivar in 2016. He is particularly interested in rebloomers and arilbreds, which grow very easily in his location.

Howard showed us pictures of his tall bearded iris introductions and seedlings to come.

His 2016 introductions were Organ Mountain Sunrise and Chihuahuan Desert, which got an AIS Honorable Mention award in 2018.

In 2017, he introduced Desert Paradise, Silver Silk, and Tango in the Night, which has rebloomed in California.

In 2018, he introduced Dancer's Dream, Ay Chihuahua, and Copper Angel. The last two have rebloomed in California.

In 2019, he introduced Desert Blush, Gold Dust Woman, and Flamingo Fever, which won the AIS Zurbrigg-Mahan Cup for Best Seedling at the 2017 AIS National Convention in Des Moines, Iowa. He also introduced Jedi Princess, a space age iris, and late-blooming Zia Sunshine.

In 2020, he introduced Banana Boat, Heartfelt Desire, Hot Embers, and Monarch Falls.

His 2021 introductions are Frank's Dream, Nittany Lion, Tonatzin, Velvet Rhapsody, Vulcan Sun, and Witchy Woman.

Howard began hybridizing arilbreds in 2016 and has introduced Chihuahua Night. He showed us his arilbred seedlings as well.

Howard reminded us about the 2022 AIS National Convention taking place in Las Cruces, New Mexico and showed us pictures of the iris gardens which will be featured.

Old Business

Jane J. said judging of our virtual show will start once photos are posted.

Sales at the Stanford Gardeneur pop-up event were \$672. We've been invited back to sell rhizomes July 24. People are rabid to grow things - there was a line out the door.

Wild Iris



The wild purple iris photo was taken near Bass Lake by Cameron Russie (Mikey's granddaughter) on May 15th. Garry Knipe says that is very likely Iris hartwegii. "It is usually yellow through much of Sierra Nevada. It is often lavender, purple, or maroon south of Yosemite."

The wild yellow iris photo was taken a couple of days ago by Carol Dahout in the Castle Rock State Park in the Santa Cruz Mountains. Garry's ID: "There are 3 species of

Pacific Coast Iris that live in the Santa Cruz Mountains:

- I. douglasiana which typically grows very close to the coast, often within a mile or two of the water
- I. macrosiphon which is scattered in various places with lots of variability in its

features, but usually prefers more open meadows or part shade.

I. fernaldii - which is all over the place, especially on the edge of wooded areas.

There is a great batch of them on the slopes to the right of the trail on the final approach to Summit Rock (overlooking Silicon Valley) less than a mile before you get to the Castle Rock parking lot. (Unfortunately, the park has closed the trail to Summit Rock during bloom season since birds of prey like to use the big rock outcropping for nesting that time of year.)



Complicating the identification of PCI in the Santa Cruz mountains is the fact that these three species often interbreed where their ranges overlap and a particular plant might show some of the features of two or three of the above species. This Iris was probably I. fernaldii. They are usually a pale cream or yellow color and are quite common in and around the wooded areas up there."



Iris Culture

We are winding down on the bearded iris, Louisiana, and spuria blooms for this year. If your garden has them, the Japanese and some of the species are in bloom. It pays to diversify your iris collection for an extended bloom season!

Keep your iris beds clean by cutting off spent blooms all the way down to the rhizome and trimming off the dead leaves. Otherwise, let the leaves remain in place for added nutrients for the developing new rhizomes. Let your irises breathe. Remove weeds around the rhizomes. Lightly fertilize the rebloomers. Irises need water during June and July as they are producing rhizomes for next year's bloom.


