Dahout's Digs

June 2022

Due to the spike in COVID infections, we will, once again, be meeting on Zoom for the protection of all. While this new strain does not appear to be as deadly, it is highly contagious. The symptoms range from having a bad head cold – fever, headache, congestion, cough, fatigue to not having any symptoms at all although testing positive. You can get free at home test kits from CVS, Walgreens or Costco or you can order them online from the government for free. If you test positive, please quarantine until you test negative, even if you feel fine.

Although our iris bloom is pretty much past, there is no let up for work to be done in your garden. Now is the time to fertilize, preferably with fertilizer lower in nitrogen (5-10-10). Too much nitrogen encourages foliage growth which makes the iris more susceptible to pests and diseases. Sprinkle a handful around each clump and be sure to water it in. Continue to water thru June and keep the weeds away. Amend your soil, if needed, but do not put mulch too close to your iris.

In July, it will be time to dig and divide. Be sure to label your dug iris with the name of the iris on the center leaf, trim the fan and trim the roots. We will be collecting rhizomes for the St. Leo sale on July 30th and Yamagami's on August 6th.

Your garden expresses who you are. It is not just a collection of flowers and tomatoes and vegetables. It usually reflects your personality, if unintentionally. I think that's what's so interesting about visiting other people's gardens.

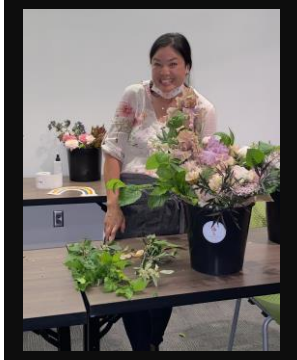

Minutes CBRIS Meeting, May 5, 2022

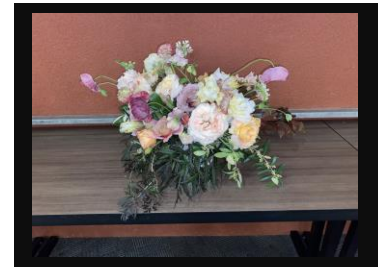
President Carol Dahout called the meeting to order at 7:30.



Program

Charmaine Turbrow, of Turbrow Farms in Los Altos Hills, gave a demonstration of flower arranging using iris. She used flowers in a monochromatic color scheme, choosing one part of the color wheel and staying within it. She used contrasting greenery to build a “nest” of interlocking stems to support the flowers. She suggested cutting flowers before 8:30 am and storing them with their stems in a Floralife Express 500 solution. It is good to choose flowers with buds closed or only partially open.

After Charmaine built her “nest” of greenery using a dome made from chicken wire as a stand in the bottom of the container, Charmaine layered roses, peonies, and irises in the arrangement.



Business Meeting

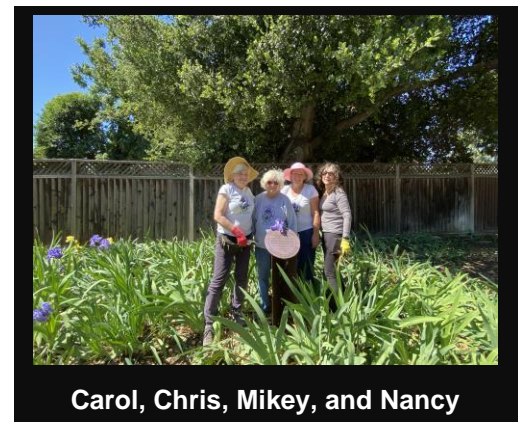
All potted iris but six were sold.

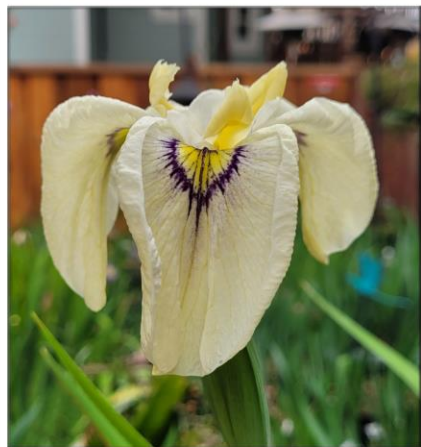

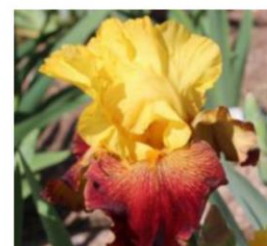
