

#### Labeling the Iris Rhizome

Wash and trim the iris and the roots. Using a black Sharpie, write on the inside leaf in the center. The inside is the part that is adjacent to the rhizome. The center leaf is best because the outside ones will shrivel, dry and fall off.

We would like the fans on the longer side as we will try to freshen them up by trimming again for the garage sales later in the month.

#### **July Culture**

Now through September is the time to divide bearded irises in our area. Withhold water for two weeks before digging to force them into dormancy. Water a day before digging if ground is very hard. Separate irises into single fans if they have five leaves, smaller rhizomes should be left attached to the "mother". Replant as soon as possible if the weather is 'normal'; avoid planting new divisions during a "heat wave". Water 2-3 times weekly until three new leaves have grown, then once a week until the winter rains begin.

## **Passing**



Jane Anne Walters - She was a lovely lady, a true and faithful Christian, who had a smile and a helping hand for one and all. She was always upbeat, with a dozen activities keeping her busy. Her garden was charming in an old fashioned way—with enamelware items, an on-going collection of dishes, cups, pots, pans, pitchers, etc., being scattered through the plantings, and featured on fences and gates. Flagstone stepping stones and graveled pathways guided friends and visitors around the back yard flower beds to a gazebo where comfortable chairs, pillows, a settee, and small tables encouraged people to sit and visit with the gracious hostess who never failed to provide a cup of tea or a soft drink accompanied with a plate of tasty homemade goodies. Her flowers were her delight and iris were featured, of course. Her ability to grow beautiful clumps of Gary Knipe's PCI introductions and trials was singular. We all were in awe!!!

Her interests and talents were legend. Jane Anne was an active member of CBRIS and contributed entries in shows of individual bloomstalks in several categories and always one or more floral arrangements featuring the iris currently in bloom in her yard. Did I mention sewing? She was an outstanding seamstress, who did beautiful quilting as well as stitching up more common items such as curtains, pillow covers, table cloths, and other household accessories. She had her sewing machine on the patio in summer months where her activities overflowed from the house, and she could sew and enjoy her garden at the same time.

Another of her passions was an on-going collection of baskets--not just common baskets, but those prized collectible Longaberger baskets that are rare finds--now that the company is no longer in business. Large or small, she loved them all and put them to good use throughout her house. In days when she was mobile, she would scout out the baskets in thrift stores and was overjoyed if a friend arrived at her door with a 'found' Longaberger treasure for her.

Life was not always easy for Jane Anne ...She lost her beloved young teen-age daughter to a car accident. Later her son became so chronically ill that he had to give up his work and move back home with her where she became a caregiver. But she never lost her positive attitude---always seeing the best in everyone and giving back in kind. Her Christian faith provided solace and courage for her throughout her life.

It is with heavy hearts that we say good-bye and farewell to Jane Anne Walters who passed to her heavenly home on Saturday, July 4, 2020. She succumbed to complications of COVID 19 which she contracted from caregivers in her Assisted Living facility where she had been staying while recuperating from a fall earlier in the Spring. She will be sorely missed as a long time member of CBRIS, as a friend to all, and a special person to many who were fortunate enough to become closely acquainted.

John Pesek: She was always so cheerful, so positive, and very knowledgeable about growing iris.




