# **CBRIS Minutes**

June 11, 2022

President Carol Dahout called the meeting to order at 7:33. P.M.

We welcomed new member Linda Lomparis, who is also a member of the Monterey Bay Iris Society.

#### Program:

Jeff Bennett gave us a history of the Dry Creek Garden.

The Dry Creek Garden is in Alameda, an area originally populated by the Costanoan tribe of Native Americans. It became part of Mission San Jose and then part of a 17,000-acre grant by Governor Alvarado to Jose de Jesus Vallejo in 1840. Vallejo sold 10,000 acres to Jonas Clark in the 1850's. After 1855, a train station was built nearby and the locale became a destination for social gatherings, featuring picnic grounds and later a dance floor and band.

In 1884, August May, who owned a butcher shop in San Francisco, bought 1,260 acres from Jonas Clark. These acres became known as the Dry Creek Ranch and were used by May's family as a private summer retreat. In 1900, after August May's death, a cottage was designed and built by his son-in-law, Henry Meyers, for Sofia May, August's widow. Sofia left the entire ranch to her daughter, Bertha, Henry Meyers' wife.

The Dry Creek Ranch eventually passed to Bertha's three daughters, Mildred, Edith, and Jeanette. All three daughters attended UC Berkeley in the 1920's. Mildred became an architect, Edith, a pediatrician, and Jeanette, a botanist. The three sisters lived together in Alameda, none of them having married. Jeanette and Mildred began to lay out gardens at Dry Creek Ranch in 1928. The sisters were very philanthropical and in 1951 began to sponsor an annual fundraiser at their Dry Creek property for the Alameda Welfare Council. The fundraiser featured booths selling food, crafts, vegetables, plants, and shrubs. Tables with umbrellas for bridge were also set up. These fundraisers continued for 20 years, attracting hundreds of attendees annually.

Dr. Edith Meyers died in 1971. After her death, Mildred and Jeannette donated most of the Dry Creek Ranch property to the East Bay Regional Park District, keeping only the cottage and 60 acres for themselves. After their deaths, the rest of the property passed to the Park District in 1995. It opened to the public in 2007.

#### **Business Meeting**

The club picnic will be on July 17 at 9 am at Ortega Park. Chad Schroter will be our auctioneer. **Due to the reemergence of COVID, we will not have a pot luck.** Bring your own lunch. The club will provide drinks, cups, and ice.

Mark asked for volunteers to grow door prize irises for 2023.

The club needs rhizomes for our rhizome sales at St. Leo's on July 30 and Yamagami's on August 6. Sign-up sheets to help at the rhizome sales will be at the picnic.

We are considering raising the price of rhizomes to \$5 each. A Zoom board meeting will be scheduled to discuss raising prices at our sales to help balance the rising cost of soil, etc. for our potted irises.

We need a new venue for our potting party, as Carol's driveway is filled by construction supplies.

#### Culture

Are you dividing or planting new iris rhizomes this year? If so, it is time to begin working in the iris beds again.

Plan on which clumps or section of your yard to dig. Dig up the entire clump, keeping each clump separated with their label. Pull apart the rhizomes and toss the old ones. For the remaining healthy rhizomes, trim the roots to a few inches and trim the fans anywhere from 6-10 inches. Mark the inner leaf with the name of the variety.

Wash the rhizome by dipping all newly acquired rhizomes and even your own in a bleach solution – one part bleach to nine parts water. Allow the rhizome to sit in the solution for 10 to 15 minutes. Then rinse in clear water and set them out in the shade to dry completely. The rhizomes may stay out of the ground for several weeks as long as they are kept cool and dry.

Prepare your beds before replanting. The adobe like soil in the Santa Clara Valley needs some compost added. Some gardeners add a bit of sand. I have started adding some pea gravel to try and loosen that hard, clay soil. A bit of bone meal in each hole will give the rhizome a boost.

Of course, the rhizomes must be watered when replanting. Water them deeply and at least once a week until the iris is established or until the winter rains take over. They do not like to be overwatered but must have water to get a good growth started.

Take your time for digging, dividing, and replanting. We can usually replant in our area all through September. Pick your time to redo your iris beds when the temperature is not terribly hot.

Remember to share some of those extra rhizomes with your favorite iris club, family and friends. We do want to spread our love of the iris flower.



The <u>2022 AIS Photo Contest</u> is in full swing, but there is still time to get your photos in. Now that shows have resumed, we want to see pictures of your events, gardens and pets. You could win prizes! The **deadline for entry is August 1st at midnight, Pacific time**. The <u>entry form</u> (pdf) has the details.

Please note: "Digital photo submissions to the Photo Contest must be high resolution (300 dpi or higher) and at least 4 X 6 inches in size. (Saved as a "maximum quality" jpeg, that would be a file size of approximately 1.4 MB)

#### 2022 AIS Photo Contest

The winning photo of each category will be published in the AIS January Bulletin and on the AIS web site.

Prior year's winners and honorable mentions can be viewed on the AIS web site at www.irises.org.

The 2022 winner of each category will receive a 2022 introduction (within USA only). The winner of each category will also receive a single annual membership, or single e-membership or annual membership extension to AIS. Winners who are AIS life members will receive an e-membership or annual membership in an AIS Section of their choice. Runners-up of each category will receive a 2019 to 2020 introduction (within the USA only).

The full details on how to enter are included on the official entry form that can be downloaded using the following link: 2022 AIS Photo Contest Entry Form (Adobe PDF file)

This is a PDF file that can be downloaded and filled in using Adobe Acrobat, saved, and emailed to the contest chair along with your entries or alternately it can be printed and mailed in.

Simply fill out the entry form designating in which category you are entering your digital photos (e.g. Cat3 Margaret Hart with 'Snow Flurry') and use the same designation for your photo file name. Then e-mail (or snail mail a CD) of your digital high-resolution photos, along with the entry form, to the AIS Photo Contest Coordinator, at the address indicated below and on the form.

You may submit up to 6 photos total for this contest. They may be all entered in one category or separate categories. The deadline for entries is Midnight, August 1st, 2022 – California Time.

(NOTE: Any photo submitted that was a winner in previous years will automatically be disqualified.)

There must be irises in the photo and irises in the photos should be of the Genus Iris.

Entries will be selected and judged in six (6) categories:

- 1. Irises in a landscape or garden. (Show the iris in the garden.)
- 2. Irises in a field. (Show the field of irises)
- 3. A person or people at iris events or tours with irises.
- 4. Close up of an iris or irises. (Whole flower is showing.)
- 5. Iris photos macro (close up of bloom segments.)
- 6. Photos of pets, wildlife or garden art with the irises.
- \*\*\* Youth photographers (under 19) can choose to enter either the Youth Category (photo must have an iris in it) or any of the adult categories, but not both. \*\*\*

"High Resolution" digital photos are required (i.e. no smaller than 1600×1000 dimensions) with maximum file size of 1.2 MB. Entries can be emailed (Maximum two photos per email) to susandriver801@gmail.com

If you only have prints take them to a store to have them digitized in "High Resolution" files placed on a CD (double check the photos are there) and mail said CD along with your entry form.) Include name of the variety or person in each photo on the entry form and photo file name, if known.

A panel of 3 – 5 judges will judge the photos received and their decisions will be final.
