In October we always focus on beardless iris, i.e. Louisiana, Siberian, Japanese, Spuria, species, and species crosses. This month we will feature Spuria Iris with an AIS Webinar that Anne Cadd presented over Zoom. Anna was born in Poland. She went into botany and holds a master's degree in Biology and a PHD in Plant ecology. While visiting an aunt in Santa Rosa, she met David Cadd, and married him. She and David ran the Cadd's Beehive Iris Garden in Healdsburg. They introduced over 100 irises, 70 bearded and 30 spuria. They have won three Nies medals for their spuria. Since David passed away, Anna runs the garden by herself. The title of her talk is "Spuria Iris for every garden: A little history, a lot of beauty".

The Region 14 Spring Regional meeting will be held 4/30/22 – 5/1/22, at Dry Creek Garden in Union City. Details will follow.

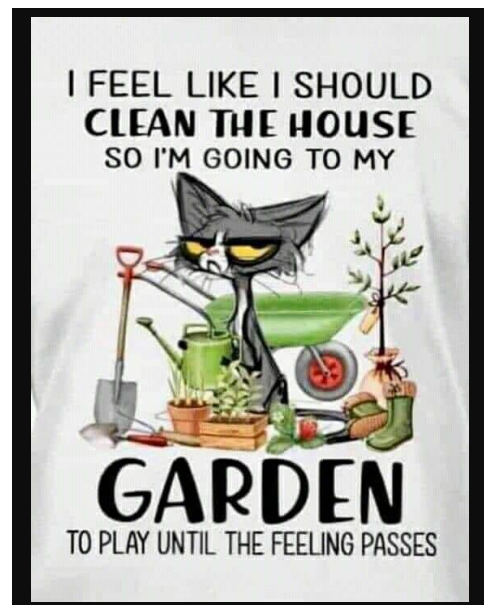

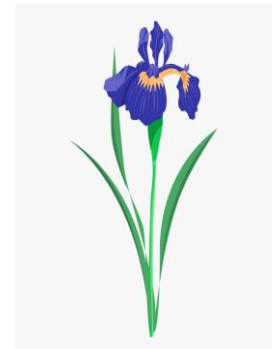

CBRIS Board Meeting

September 3, 2021

Present: Carol, Elaine, Riley, Shirley, Peter, Mary, Mikey, Mark, Jane J., Chris, Alice, Jane R., Andrea

1. Proposed budget for 2021/2022 was presented for discussion and approval.

Line 2A - \$150 should be added for President's expenses for Fall Regional meeting.

Line 3B - Should be increased to \$270 to pay sales tax. We pay sales once a year in January.

Line 8 - \$300 to buy pots and soil for potted iris sale. We have to buy pots in alternating years and didn't buy pots last year.

Fall Regional is not budgeted for because we expect to cover its expenses with Registration income.

Approval for budget was deferred to general membership meeting in October.

2. Contribution to AIS scholarship fund.

Requirements for Fall Regional meeting were discussed and responsibilities assigned.

4. Election of Board Members

Slate of proposed new board members was nominated:

Carol, Jane J., and Mary will extend their terms for one year as President, Vice-President, and Treasurer respectively. Mark, Mikey, and Chris were nominated to be Directors for two years.

The general membership will vote on proposed new board tonight.

5. Three Creek Garden

CBRIS members have been asked by City of San Jose to help clean up Three Creek Garden on September 18 from 8 - 10:30.

There was concern expressed that two and a half hours wasn't enough time to make any significant improvement to the garden, which badly needs weeding, digging, and dividing. Carol said she would talk to the City of San Jose and request more time. Elaine suggested we make it an outing with a picnic.

Board meeting adjourned at 7:30.

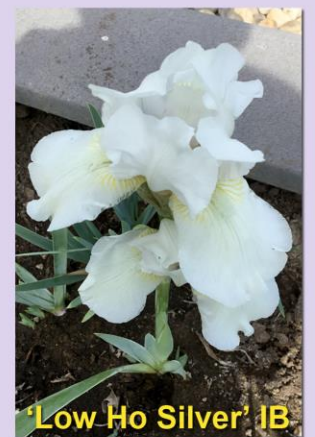

Beardless Iris Culture

Culture of the beardless irises is different than that of the bearded irises. Transplanting should be done in the fall or in early spring. Exposed roots should never be allowed to dry out while out of the ground. Water heavily after transplanting. They should be set slightly deeper than the tall bearded. Japanese iris should be planted in a distinct depression in heavy soil to assist in supplying moisture to the plant. Siberians can tolerate light shade while the Spurias demand full sun. Louisianas and Japanese can use a bit of light shade from the hot summer afternoons to prevent sun scald although they do need a good six hours of sun. Louisianas and Japanese require moist conditions during the summer months. Spurias want dry soil no matter how hot it may get. All, except Louisianas, should be planted in a permanent spot where they can remain for many years as they resent being disturbed. Louisianas tend to creep; and therefore, should be tended to every few years. All are heavy feeders and need to be fertilized regularly.
