Pacific Coast Iris Culture

Soil: Loose well drained soil that is slightly acidic; add soil sulfur and peat moss; might want to add oyster shell to help loosen heavy clay soil.

Water: Keep moist the first year until established. Do not water in the heat of a summer day. Some summer water is necessary but only when cool.

Light: Filtered shade works the best in our area.

Fertilizer: Very light application of an acid based general fertilizer once a year in the spring

Mulching: Two inches of pine needles or fir bark for the first year

Transplanting: If new white roots are not showing, leave rhizomes in water until new roots begin to appear.

They should appear in 7 to 10 days. Plant immediately and never allow the roots to dry out.

Established plants should be left alone until a loss of vigor is noticed usually in four or five years.

Minutes CBRIS Meeting, October 8, 2021

Co-President Carol Dahout called the meeting to order at 7:36. There were 19 members on the call. Guest: Erica Dhuey.

Program

Anna Cadd gave a presentation on the history and judging of spuria iris. Spurias grow two to five feet high and have attractive foliage. The flowers are shaped somewhat like an orchid and come in many colors. Spuria varieties grow from Europe to China and from marshes to deserts. Sir Martin Foster introduced the first spuria hybrid in England in1895. It was named 'Monspur', and was a cross between *I. Monnieri* and *I. Spuria*. Eric Nies used 'Monspur' to hybridize most of the important cultivars in today's spuria pedigree.



Spurias are easy to grow with minimal care and make a dramatic effect in the garden. They can be grown anywhere in Canada and the US except Hawaii. They require alkaline soil. They die back in the fall. They should be planted three feet apart, as they develop into very large clumps and are hard to dig up.


Spuria irises are judged on their clump effect, flower, plant, and distinctiveness. Spurias are viewed from a distance so the flower must grow above the foliage. Flowers are judged according to their color, substance, and durability. Floriferousness is important. A highly rated spuria is distinctive and easily recognizable.
