### 'SHOWERS OF FLOWERS'

We had a beautiful show on April 16<sup>th</sup> at the Campbell Community Center. I thank everyone who pitched in to help and congratulate those who entered the horticulture and artistic divisions. Well done!



In 2019, CBRIS sponsored the iris show for the AIS Convention held in San Ramon and then the pandemic hit. We cancelled our shows for 2020, 2021 and 2022. Many of our newer members had not experienced an iris show. It was wonderful to see them catch on to the excitement of entering a show, clerking with the judges, and sharing their love of the iris flower with the public.



We had 15 members enter both divisions for a total of 96 Horticulture entries and 19 Artistic arrangements. We will have the award presentations at the CBRIS June meeting, our last meeting before the summer break.

### SARATOGA FARMERS MARKET

The following week, we had a booth at the farmers market at West Valley College where we sold our 2-gallon potted iris. It was a beautiful day and we sold most of our pots for a total take of \$1,098.00. I was able to sell the few remaining pots out of my driveway to our customer email list for an additional \$245.00, bringing the total to \$1,343.



We do have pots that did not have an increase, meaning that there was only one plant in the pot. We do not sell these to the public as our fear is that the one stalk will bloom out, the plant will die and our public will be disappointed. We want happy, returning customers!

I am making these pots without an increase available to members for free, and only ask for the return of the pot so that we can reuse it. Chances are good that they will live, but it may take an extra year to bloom.

The ones I have are: Hemstitched, Devonshire Cream, Betty Ford, It's no Secret, Got the Picture, Haunted Heart, Awesome Alex, Restless Tide, Got the Look, In Person, Double Shot, Peggy Sue, Free Will and Serena Louise.

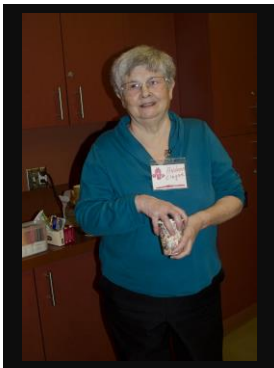

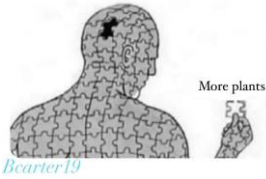

What a great year for the iris bloom! They might be drought tolerant but they most certainly did enjoy some extra rain in our area this last winter. The bearded are blooming nicely and the beardless are just starting to send up stalks with a few getting ready to bloom.

It is a difficult time to weed the iris bed as the stalks could easily snap. Do cut or snap off the spent blooms as low as possible. Remove any diseased leaves. As the iris in your garden bloom, check to see if they are properly named. Most importantly – enjoy the blooms!

The symposium is an annual popularity poll of Tall Bearded iris conducted by the American Iris Society. All AIS members and non-members may vote for 25 irises in this symposium. ### Dry Creek Garden

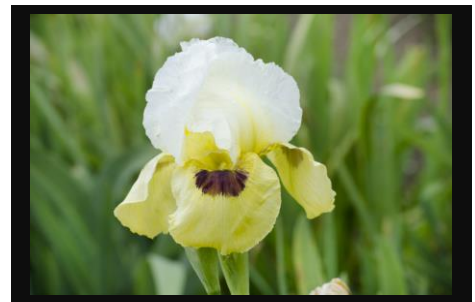
CBRIS members are invited to visit Dry Creek Garden as it is open to the public for visitors on the following dates.
