Guidelines for Certification as an AIS Artistic Judge

Contact your regional AIS Judge's Training chair, Carol Cullen, as to your intention to become a certified artistic judge, and to learn the region's policies.

You must already be an AIS accredited judge in order to qualify for the certification, unless you are an AIS member who already has vast experience, and other floral certifications or awards, which may qualify you for the artistic judge certification. (This would be determined by the regional judge's training chairperson)

You must attain a copy of the new AIS Judges Handbook.

8 hours of training is required:

- 1 hour covering the Principles of Design (Found in Chapter 27)
- 1 hour covering The Point Scale (Found in Chapter 27)
- 2 hours covering the rest of Chapter 27
- 2 hours of apprenticeship, this involves watching actual judging of the artistic design division at a show or shows, in person or through virtual presentations.
- 2 hours of actual hands-on designing with a design judge (AIS or otherwise) or proof of winning a Best Design of Show or a Best of Design Sweepstakes.

Pass tests that are given out at training and reported to the regional AIS Judge's Training chairperson.

Complete an activity report on a yearly basis until all requirements are met. There is no time limit as to when hours may be completed.

Once a certificate has been given, nothing else is required to keep it valid, unless The Principles of Design change, which is not probable or logical.



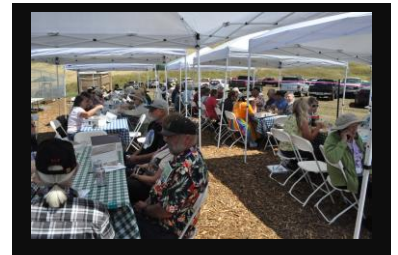
Spring Regional 2022 – Dry Creek Garden



For the first time since the pandemic arrived and so rudely interrupted our lives, Region 14, American Iris Society, hosted an in-person event—the 2022 Spring Regional at Dry Creek Park. With a final attendance of over 67 people, the event started at 9:00 A.M. and we arrived to coffee and treats as a prelude to getting our packet of information.

Jeff Bennett, head gardener, was on hand to greet us. The garden is still recovering from the theft of almost all the guest irises, but there was good, but early, bloom on many varieties.

In the morning, Riley Probst presented judges training on medians. Box lunches from Panera were provided in a variety of types to suit everyone tastes.



After lunch, Jeff first spoke about the garden and then the challenges. Next one of the board members of the East Bay Park District welcomed the group. Serving Alameda and Contra Costa counties, the park district includes 73 parks covering 125,000 acres with 1,250 miles of trails and 55 miles of shoreline.

Next, Region 14's new RVP, Carolyn Hoover addressed the group; then the guest speaker took over. With wind coming up, it proved impossible to show his PowerPoint presentation, but Steve Poole proved to be an informative, entertaining, and amusing speaker, keeping the group engaged.



Steve Poole is working in other interesting areas—he has gone back to the species and is creating hybrid Louisiana irises with much better branching and bud count. Another project is the attempt to double the chromosomes in Pseudatas, with the hope of creating fertile plants that would look like Japanese irises, but grow with ease.

After his talk, Steve Poole led a judges' training session on point scoring irises in the garden.

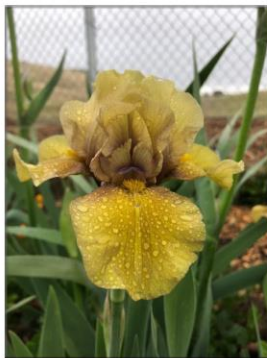

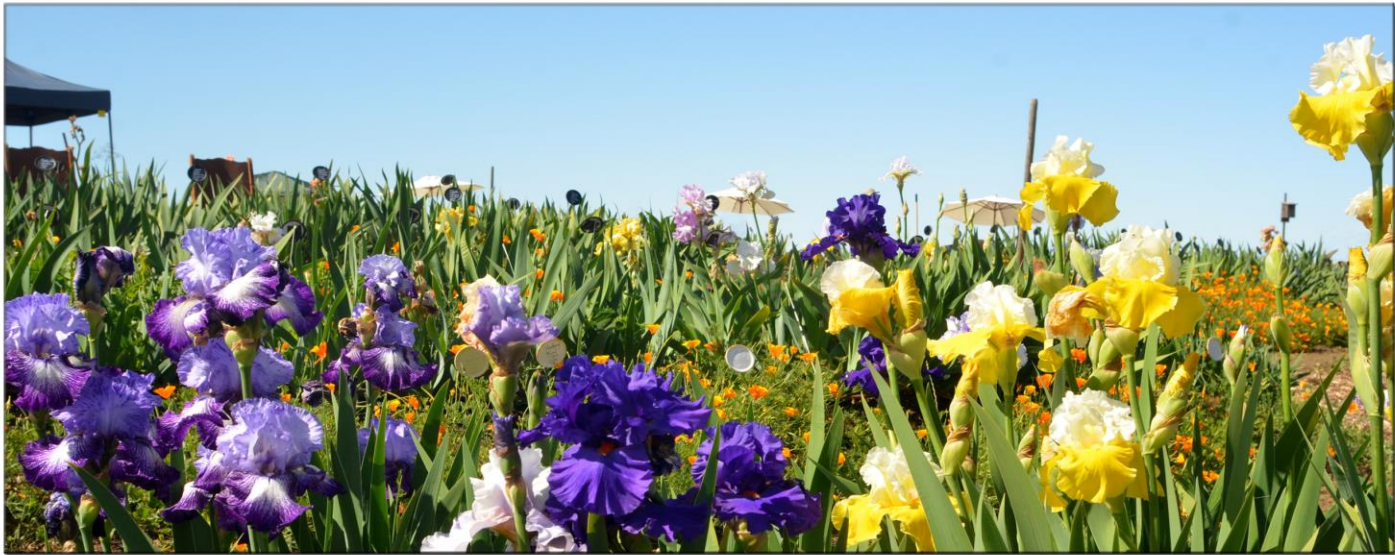

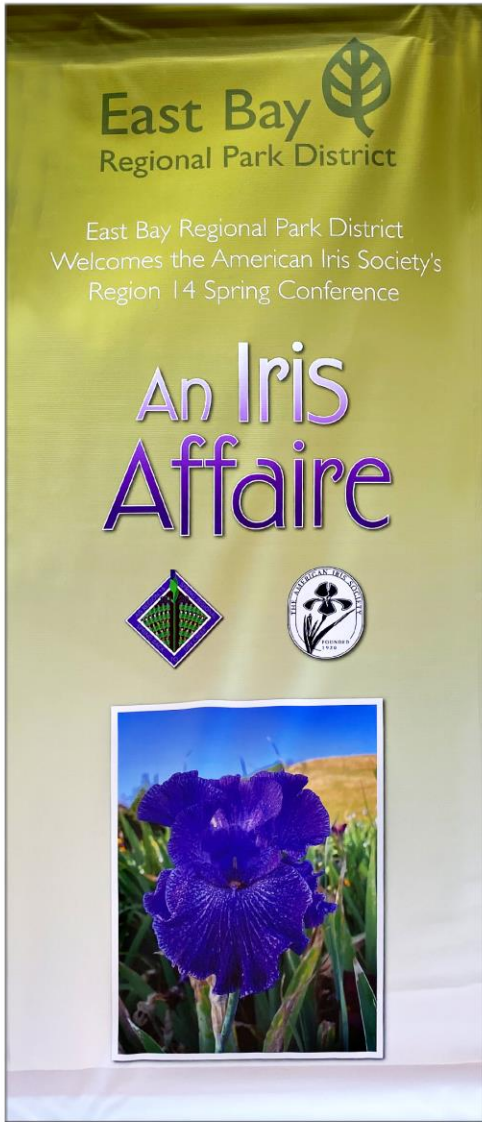

Culture

Blooming time continues! Keep watering while the irises are blooming. Then water deeply every week or two through June as this will help increase the size of the new rhizomes when dug in July or August. If you fertilize and water the rebloomers they will put another show on for you later.

Remove spent bloomstalks by cutting or snapping close to the ground. Keep after little critters and pests. Keep your beds weed free. Another important task is to check your iris labels and maps when an iris blooms. You will want the correct name if you enter an iris show. Label with an old mini-blind, a plastic knife or plant markers. A grease pencil or a china marker should be used for longer legibility as sharpies only last about a year. Ink jet labels last a few years. You may want to bury a marker down inside by the roots as an added precaution. A number two pencil works well for that. An iris garden map is always a good idea in addition to labeling. Take a photo of your irises when they are in bloom to help identify and record your irises. Work carefully, growing bloom stalks are fragile and break easily.

Watch for leaf diseases like rust and leaf spot. These are problems made worse by crowding your irises. Enjoy bloom time! Louisianas and spurias are beginning to bloom. Soon the Japanese and species will be the star of the garden.

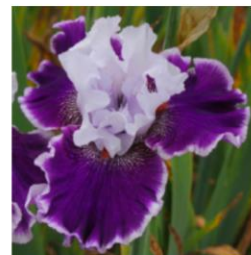

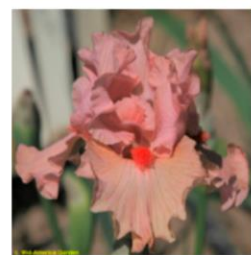
