If you have ever wanted to grow your own iris from seed, you will not want to miss Friday's meeting! Our very own Carolyn Craft will present a timely program on iris hybridizing that is sure to be fun and informative! Learn about pod and pollen parents and how to identify the parts of the flower. Carolyn will demonstrate techniques and tips for collecting pollen, making crosses, tagging and record keeping, and harvesting and planting seeds.

This is a How To event so bring in a potted iris in bloom or any cut iris bloom (exhibition quality is not necessary). Please bring a flower or two with the ovary, spathe and an inch or two of stem still attached, tweezers and if you have one, a small microscope.

Carolyn has served in numerous leadership roles for Region 14 and CBRIS, and she has been a Master Gardener for over 20 years. She resides in Los Gatos with her husband, fellow CBRIS member, Wayne. On their 1.4 acres they have tended bees, poultry and over 1,659 different types of irises. They have also grown over 100 different fruit trees, more than 100 different roses and many rare plants.

### **Minutes**

CBRIS Meeting, April 5, 2024

President Carol Dahout called the meeting to order at 7:39 PM

Carol announced April birthdays.

A memorial service for Philippa Alvis will be held on May 25 at her house.

Carol passed out show flyers.

There are still CBRIS t-shirts available: Ladies' Medium, blue, long-sleeves, Ladies' Medium, pink, v-neck, short sleeves.

Four more clerks needed for the show. Lynn, Lisa, Steve, and Linda volunteered. Need people to greet the public at the show.

**Program**: Preparing for the show.

Carol passed out lists of items needed for your show toolbox.

Jane demonstrated how to stage your iris. An iris stalk needs to be straight, with at least two branches. The terminal bud must be open. A branch can be separated from the stalk by putting a wedge of paper between the branch and the stalk. Bring the freshest flowers you can. Cut stalks the day before the show. If buds are showing color, they can be opened by leaving the stalk in a steamy bathroom overnight.

Five-gallon buckets with a place for each stalk are good for transporting iris to the show.

When staging the iris, avoid putting fingerprints on stem. Handle stem by the spathe if possible. Don't let a leaf rest on the edge of the holder. Ideally, a stem should be a maximum of twice the height of the holder

Jane passed out an example of a display label card and instructions on how to fill it out. The card should be clipped to the front of the exhibit.

There will be a division for single blooms at the show. The stalk should be about 2 inches tall. No buds are allowed. The club supplies the little bottle to display it in.

#### **Business:**

Garden tour schedule was announced.

Jeff invited us to see the arilbreds blooming at Dry Creek Garden.

Door Prizes were awarded.

Meeting adjourned at 9:30 PM.

# May Iris Culture

Ending balance, April 30, 2024

Blooming time continues! It can be difficult to weed when the garden is full of blooms. Do try to remove spent bloomstalks by cutting or snapping them close to the ground Check your labels as the irises bloom. It is so easy to look up names while in the garden. Make use of that cell phone. You will want a correctly named iris if you enter an iris show or share a rhizome with someone else. Be on the lookout for snails, earwigs and other little pests.

The ground is just starting to dry out. We have had a lot of rain this year, with a bit more expected this coming Saturday. We will eventually have to water the irises. Watering deeply every ten days or so will help increase the size of the new rhizomes when they are dug in July or August. If you fertilize and water the rebloomers they will put another show on for you later.

Enjoy bloom season!


